About **Roundabout**

Roundabout has been supporting young people who are homeless since 1977, when we operated a small emergency-based hostel in Sheffield.

Having developed our services to meet the changing needs of young people and expanded to other areas in South Yorkshire, we now provide support to over 300 young people every day. We are strongly committed to ending youth homelessness in South Yorkshire and empower young people by helping them build in confidence, develop long term independent living skills and support them with their health, education, employment and training needs.

Our wraparound approach aims to ensure that no young person has to sleep rough on the streets. As well as providing safe and secure accommodation and a range of prevention services, we also deliver comprehensive programmes of training, involvement and empowerment. We aim to support our young people to develop long-term independent living skills, in order to break the cycles of homelessness.

We want to support them in their time of need, as every young person deserves the chance to have a bright future.

This chapter in young people's lives can be incredibly tranmatic and we believe that they should be given the opportunity to turn their lives around. We give young people the chance to make mistakes and support them to create alternative endings.

Reflection on the year


Despite the challenge of COVID 19, throughout the period from April 2020 we have maintained an extraordinary level of service provision for young people needing our support in the South Yorkshire region.

Thanks to our donors, brilliant staff and volunteers and the exceptional engagement of our young people, we have continued to provide vital support across a wide range of services and have in fact, significantly increased the scope of our offering.

Highlights include: the opening of a new Group Living facility in Sheffield, that has been fully refurbished and equipped for 6 more young people; 7 of our young people were supported to commence University degree courses; we have completed our first full year of operation as preferred service provider in Rotherham; and most importantly, there were no young people rough sleeping in Sheffield, Rotherham and Doncaster during the COVID lockdown.

Thanks to our amazing supporters, and our first significant legacy donation we covered all costs and significantly expanded our services to support even more young people across South Yorkshire.

On behalf of my fellow Trustees I would like to thank Ben and all the staff for the efforts they have made during one of the most demanding years in Roundabout's history.

Despite the challenges of 2020, we were delighted to be able to expand our Group Living accommodation, ensuring that we can better support the growing and unmet needs for care leavers, asylum seekers and refugees, who are at risk of homelessness.

Our new project opened in November 2020, after a full scale renovation. The property accommodates 6 young people at any one time in a combination of self-contained and shared flats, catering for individual needs and preferences. Each young person benefits from our wraparound care and life skills development, enabling them to grow in confidence and independence before they move on. This project, generously supported by both local and National trusts and foundations, and local businesses, has the potential to turn lives around, providing stability, positive role models and 24/7 support. We aim for the young people to move on from our services full of ambition and positive aspirations for their adult lives.



Meet Ellie

Ellie* had always wanted somewhere to call home – a place that felt safe. Growing up, she lived with her family but relationships were strained and there were frequent arguments, leading her to move out and live with a friend. Soon after, her social worker introduced her to Roundabout's Group Living project and Ellie moved in.

Going through such a significant change meant that Ellie struggled to open up to Roundabout staff initially, but her confidence grew, she began to talk to the staff and and saw Group Living as home.

"Staff helped me in so many different ways, especially with my mental health. When I felt low, they talked to me and have made me laugh so many times! They've never judged me, which made me realise I can be myself."

After living at Group Living for 7 months, Ellie secured priority for council housing, so she will soon be ready to move on with her life and build her new future.

"I'm excited to see what it will be like but sad to have to say goodbye to so many wonderful people! I hope they're able to help more people like me feel welcomed and help them see a future they may also have never thought to be possible.

"If it wasn't for Roundabout I would have still been stuck looking for a place to be home - maybe I would have been homeless, but I'm grateful I wasn't. I hope more people start to learn about Roundabout, I will definitely be telling people about it if I meet anyone that was in a situation like mine, as they really have changed my life".

"They opened a door for me I never expected to be there but I will never forget how happy I was when I walked into Group Living at Roundabout and saw how happy everyone was. It made me feel like it would be a good place to start a new chapter and grow as a person."

Trusts & Grants

Thanks go to all the Trusts and Foundations who supported us through the financial year.

This has been an incredible year for support from Trusts, Grants and Foundations when many other sources of income were so negatively impacted.

Thanks to this income, we were able to fully refurbish our new Group Living project in Sheffield, providing high quality accommodation for up to six young people in furnished flats.

Our Rapid Rehousing Team benefited from support from Sheffield City Council, The Talbot Trust, The Evan Cornish Foundation and West Riding Masonic Charities.

BBC Children in Need supported our Mediation service, reducing the chances of young people becoming homeless.

The Big Lottery Reaching Communities grant provided considerable support to our Homeless Prevention Service.

The H&M Foundation funded an Employment & Skills Job Coach and provided a bursary for training & associated costs.

Future Builders benefited from grant funding from OVO, supporting a co-ordinator to enable young homeless people to refurbish a property where they subsequently live.

The Private Rented Team received grant funding from End Youth Homelessness to help & support young people moving into private rented accommodation in Sheffield, including support with rent deposits and set up costs.

The Cutlers Company Charitable Trust kindly donated towards our Peer Education project

Yorkshire Sport Foundation donated over £3,000 to allow some of our most vulnerable young people to access sporting opportunities which have had a huge impact on their physical and mental wellbeing.

The Co-op Community Fund supported furnishing and decorating costs across our properties

The Spencer Charitable Trust, Dixon Pitchfork and J G Graves kindly gave unrestricted donations, enabling us to utilise the income as appropriate for maximum effect.

Services breakdown

Every young person and their situation is different - some may need support from many services, others just one. Either way, we strive to make the end result the same: that the young person is safe, off the streets and ready to lead a successful life independently.

Roundabout believes home is the best place for a young person to be, as long as it is safe. Mediation helps families to stay living at home or move into alternative accommodation in a planned way.

Private Renting Service

Not all young people are eligible for council housing, leaving them at risk of homelessness. We help them to access accommodation in the private rented sector, maintain their tenancy and learn the life skills they need to gain independence.


We helped 53 young people access housing in the private renting sector in the past year



Future Builders

We help young people who have a need for housing to work alongside professional contractors to learn new skills and renovate neglected houses, which they then live in whilst they study for an apprenticeship.

Peer Education

Our ground breaking project is delivered by trained volunteer Peer Educators who have experienced homelessness. They deliver homeless education sessions in schools, aiming to break down stereotypes and inform young people of local organisations that can help.

We moved our sessions online and delivered live zoom lessons in schools when we were unable to meet in person.

The Peer Educators created a Teacher's Guide to Youth Homelessness which is packed with activities for teachers to use with students.

Whether they have moved out of Roundabout's accommodation and need help while they acclimatise to independent living, or they're already living in their own property but circumstances have changed, we stay by their side offering support and advice to prevent them becoming homeless.

Employment, Education & Training

Many young people have the ambition to access work or training but lack the confidence, motivation and social skills to do this successfully. We guide and motivate young people to help them access a sustainable form of education, training and employment.

Health


We help young people manage mental and physical health by acting as advocates where necessary, supporting them when attending appointments to help increase their confidence in dealing with situations that may arise in the future.

Life Skills

By ensuring young people learn vital life skills, such as budgeting, cleaning and cooking, we aim to make sure that they live successful independent lives and never have to experience homelessness again in the future.
