Our innovative approach continues to evolve, and in 2025, Roundabout became the delivery partner for Homewards' new Upstream initiative, a pioneering school-based early intervention programme tackling the root causes of youth homelessness.

None of this would be possible without the powerful collaborations we've built with local councils, funders, and community partners. Your support has enabled us to meet this unprecedented need with compassion and resilience.

Together, we can build a future where every young person can grow and thrive in a place they call home.

Victoria

26 year old Victoria left Nigeria after her parents had passed away, when she realised she couldn't live an open life back home due to her sexuality.

When she arrived in Sheffield, Victoria was in a bad place mentally – depressed and suicidal. The Home Office provided temporary accommodation whilst she was an asylum seeker, but once granted refugee status, Victoria was only given 10 days to find somewhere to live. Narrowly avoiding three weeks on the streets thanks to the kindness of a friend, Victoria then found Roundabout and was offered supported accommodation.

"Roundabout made it possible for me to have my own place and a place to rest my head. It's a blessing to have a place to call home and space to think about the future. When I was homeless I couldn't think about the future."

Roundabout's Employment & Skills Worker, Hayley, also helped Victoria figure out her career options. With a passion for helping people, and lived experience of mental health issues, she found voluntary work with a local charity.

"That's when I learned some women in the area were afraid of social workers because they feared it meant their children were going to be taken away from them. I thought, why not go into social work? If there are more social workers with my skin colour perhaps these women will feel more comfortable."

With Hayley's support, Victoria got a place on the 'Step Up to Social Work' course at Sheffield Hallam University. Since completing the course, she was inspired to apply for a Learning Disability Nursing Course, which she started this September.

"Having Roundabout's support made me feel like a burden had been lifted. Before the support of Roundabout, I felt like chains were holding me down. But now I'm able to back myself. I feel freer and more optimistic about the future. I would tell anybody experiencing homelessness to not give up. There are so many charities to help people so just keep pushing and it will come through for you."

Preventing Crisis: *Our New Early Intervention Service*

2025 saw the launch of Upstream, as Roundabout was selected to deliver this ground-breaking project in Sheffield, as part of the Royal Foundation's Homewards initiative.

The project brings targeted early intervention into secondary schools to prevent youth homelessness before it begins.

Working with Key Stage 3 pupils, Upstream uses universal screening to identify young people who may be experiencing challenges with school disengagement, poor mental health and wellbeing or family conflict.

The support offered is tailored and personalised, designed to build resilience, improve relationships and strengthen support networks. Recognising the importance of stable family relationships in keeping young people safe, Upstream also works more widely with whole family units, offering parent support and family mediation in order to work more systemically with young people and their families.

The project is based on the successful Australian Geelong Project, which led to a 20% reduction in early school leavers and a 40% drop in youth homelessness.

Upstream is now working in three schools across the city, collaborating with local services and communities to help young people develop the foundations needed for their future, reducing the risk of crises and homelessness in later life.

As interest in the project continues to grow, we remain committed to prevention as a powerful tool in breaking the cycle of youth homelessness.

Amber

Amber first came to Roundabout at 24, and with the help of our Supporting Tenants' team has been able to sustain private renting for the first time.

She grew up in quite an unstable home environment, and experienced homelessness while sofa-surfing at a young age. Her parents were separated from when she was really young and argued a lot, and Amber often felt stuck in the middle.

Amber's neurodiversity was not yet diagnosed, and this led to her 'playing up' at school. At the age of 12, Amber experienced serious abuse. This contributed to her declining mental health and behaviour, and with a lack of support at school and in her home life, she ended up leaving education aged just 13. Without an outlet for all of her complex emotions, Amber would chase validation from negative places, which often put her in risky situations.

As a result of her early experiences, Amber has sometimes struggled to express her emotions and can feel quite isolated at times. After having a child in lockdown, she began to suffer with poor mental health. Amber was desperate not to repeat the same mistakes as her parents, but putting this pressure on herself made her even more anxious.

When she first approached Roundabout for support in December 2023, Amber's wellbeing was at rock bottom, and she was struggling financially with rent and bills.

"I'm so happy I found the support of Roundabout. I have been in contact with so many services throughout my life and I never felt that I got the support I needed. I have also been reluctant to seek help in the past as I felt a sense of shame, but now I am feeling a lot more positive. Phoebe, my worker with Roundabout, helped me get my bills in order and my mental health is much improved. I feel much more comfortable with my emotions and I am in a much better place. Things can still be a little bit up and down but I feel like my life is heading in the right direction again."

During her time at Roundabout, Amber became a Peer Educator. She was keen to show that there is more to homelessness than meets the eye and there's always help out there if someone needs it.

The Roundabout Journey

No two young people's stories are the same, and neither is the help we offer. Tailored to each individual, our services offer wraparound support for everyone who comes through the door. Whether that's a young mum who's been sofa-surfing or a refugee with nowhere to call home, we're a lifeline for young people who need to feel rooted. And we offer so much more than just a roof, empowering youngsters to build a brighter future.

Towards Independence

All young people within Roundabout's services also have access to a range of support, ultimately providing them with the skills, knowledge and confidence they need to live independently. This includes life skills, employment and volunteering, mental health and wellbeing, counselling, drug and alcohol support, parenting support and other individual needs.



Families *Talk It Out*

Talk It Out, our Mediation Service, is here to support young people and their families, fostering understanding by talking, and crucially, listening.

Strained relationships at home are a common challenge faced by young people at risk of homelessness. Talk It Out helps families to resolve conflicts and create a better way to move forward together.

The impact of Talk It Out

In 2024/25, **54** families were helped by Mediation.

After mediation, almost **9 in every 10** young people stayed or returned to living in the family home, with no youngsters left sofa-surfing.



Libbi

Last year, Libbi was having issues at home and ended up seeking help from Roundabout's services in Rotherham. She was given a room at our Rotherham Hostel, living alongside four other young people.

At first, Libbi found it hard – she'd always been quite shy and was spending a lot of time in her room. With the support of her keyworker, Nimo, she plucked up the courage to attend weekly cooking sessions – not only learning to cook healthy, nutritious meals, but also beginning to socialise with the other young people. Day trips to Yorkshire Wildlife Park and Go Karting also helped Libbi to get out of her comfort zone, growing in confidence along the way.

After a few months at Broom Road, and a few group bbqs to boot, Libbi was ready to take the next step and move into a Roundabout 'Dispersed' property in Rotherham. Although living more independently was challenging at first, it also gave Libbi the chance to make the space a bit more her own, and build confidence around the skills needed to live alone.

"I realised how much I was missing out on as a teenager. Roundabout has really helped me with relationships, with confidence and with my independence."

With Nimo's support, Libbi also recently got back in touch with her dad – having not seen him for around six years. She's enjoying rebuilding a relationship with him, and is grateful for him doing the occasional food shop for her.

A lot has changed over the past year, and Libbi has a powerful message to her 17-year-old self:

"Everything will be ok. You'll get through it. I've learnt that, because of Roundabout, bad things do get better."

As Libbi prepares to apply for her own council flat, she feels more ready to take that next step towards living fully independently. Although Libbi has nerves around the move, she's really looking forward to being able to paint the walls, and hopes to get a cat to keep her company.

Young people *out and about*

A new base *in Rotherham*

We're proud of our unique approach to supporting young people in Rotherham. From their first contact, each young person is matched with a dedicated keyworker who stays with them throughout their Roundabout journey. For those who may struggle with relationships or attachment, this consistency helps build trust and strong, positive connections.

Our Rotherham service offers the same breadth of support as Sheffield – from Emergency Accommodation and Rapid Rehousing to Dispersed Properties and Tenancy Support – ensuring we can help young people at any stage of their journey towards independence.

A committed team of ten project workers and six night staff make sure no young person is left feeling alone or isolated, and the newly refurbished Sherwood House is a key part of this service. With one emergency bed, four longer-term rooms and two bedsits, it provides different levels of support to meet individual needs. As Senior Project Worker Nimo explains, “you never know what you’re going to walk into – we’re always adapting to the needs of the young people in the service. That’s why it’s so rewarding – especially seeing young people grow and thrive.”

Residents at Sherwood benefit from 24-hour staffing, shared cooking sessions and day trips, while the bedsits help young people build the skills needed for the next step – maintaining their own tenancy in social housing or the private sector.

Roundabout goes far beyond just providing a roof. Every young person supported in Rotherham also has access to our wraparound services – from mental health and wellbeing support to mediation, education, employment and skills.

Better together *Partnerships in action*

In 2025, we formed new partnerships that have created exciting opportunities for young people supported by Roundabout. These collaborations have not only raised vital awareness of youth homelessness but also inspired transformative fundraising. Thanks to the dedication and generosity of our partners, we could continue delivering life-changing support and helping young people build brighter, more secure futures.

Building brighter futures with Strata Homes

Doncaster-based house builder Strata Homes chose Roundabout as its Charity Partner in 2025.

Their support has included a wide range of activities, from joining our Murder Mystery Dinner, Charity Golf Day, and Three Peaks Challenge, to running their own high-energy events like Go Karting, Yard Ball and Tough Mudder.

A highlight of the year was their Charity Ball at The Royal Armouries in Leeds, raising an incredible £50,000.

Beyond fundraising, Strata has become a true advocate for our work, helping to raise awareness and drive change for vulnerable young people across the region. We're deeply grateful for their enthusiasm and generosity.





Beats and Boxing *Expanding Horizons*

World-class experiences for young people have been made possible through partnerships with GB Boxing, based at the English Institute of Sport, and RiteTrax, a local music charity. These initiatives are designed to boost confidence, build skills, and create a sense of purpose for 16-25 year olds facing homelessness.

Through a music project supported by the Tramlines Trust and the Sarah Nulty Power of Music Foundation, young people are experimenting with DJing, songwriting, beat-making, and music production. Hosted at RiteTrax's Plot 22 space in Sheffield, the sessions have really encouraged creativity and self-expression. "It's incredibly inspiring to see young people go from shy and hesitant to confidently writing and performing their own songs," said Ben Allen, Roundabout's Fundraising Officer.

Inside the ring, a new collaboration with GB Boxing is using the power of sport to foster discipline, resilience, and self-worth. Taking place at state-of-the-art facilities in Sheffield, the programme introduces young people to boxing fundamentals while also addressing mental health, inequality, and social isolation. "This partnership creates a safe, energetic environment for our young people to grow and thrive," said Emily Jones, Fundraising Manager at Roundabout.

Together, these projects are unlocking potential and offering tools for independence – enabling young people to break the cycle of homelessness.






Reflection *on the year*



2025 has been a year of outstanding outcomes. Whilst providing record levels of service and support to young people at risk of homelessness, Roundabout has also managed to achieve a substantial increase in its financial reserves. This has enabled the Board to fulfil its long-term Reserves policy objectives, which for many years we have struggled to reach.

The Trustees have consequently taken a strategic decision to use some of the reserves for further investment in housing resource for young people otherwise at risk of homelessness. This, in part, reflects our serious concern that the problem of youth homelessness is growing rather than diminishing – despite our best efforts.

Against this background of growth and hard work, on behalf of my fellow Trustees, I would again like to thank the Senior Leadership Team and all our staff for their dedication, commitment and professionalism.

I would also like to thank our many volunteers, partners, donors and supporters and all who have contributed to the phenomenal efforts during 2025.
